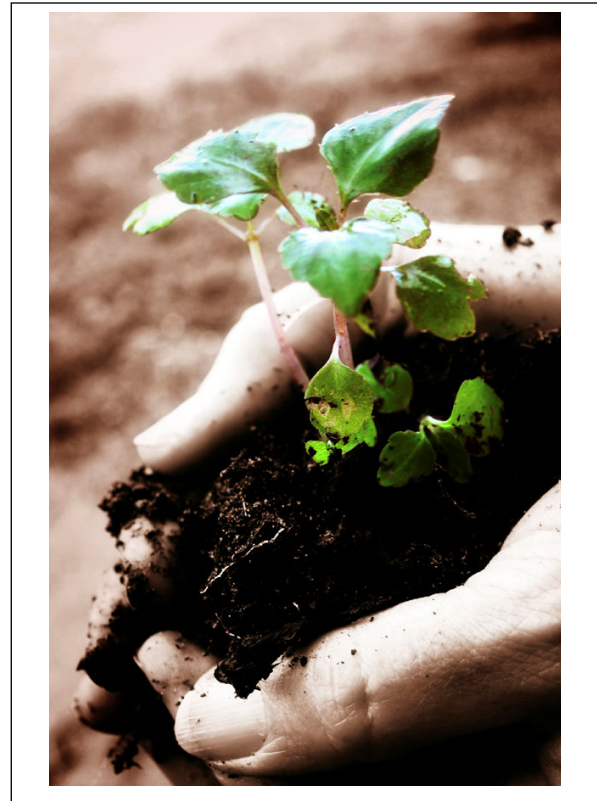
PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

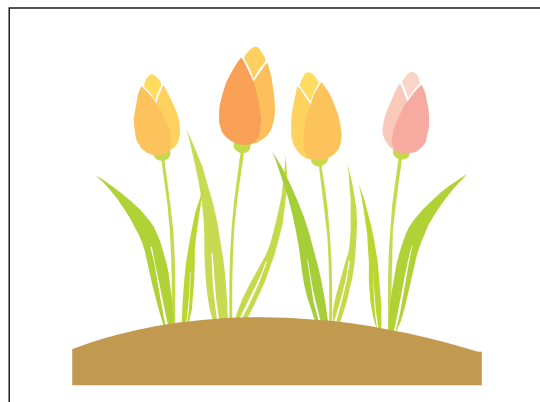
NEW AND NOTEWORTHY

PROVINCIAL SCIENCE FAIR

In April, Shari judged the **Provincial Science Fair**. The Junior prize was awarded to Madeline Crawford, a grade 4 student at Eliot River Elementary for her project "It's Alive - Inventing New Food with Bacterial Fermentation" Madeline made yogurt out of several different kinds of milk substitute beverages, as her sister is allergic to cow's milk and soy milk. She gave a fantastic presentation and had even written to the president of the rice milk company suggesting his company produce yogurt!

Emily Ross, from East Wiltshire School, received the Intermediate Prize for her project "Remember to Think, Thinking to Remember - Preventing Alzheimers" Emily investigated how different food products reacted on proteins which are similar in make up to the fibroids which grow in the brain during Alzheimers. Emily's results show that Omega -3s may have a beneficial effect in fighting this disease.

The Senior prize was awarded to Marina Sanford, from Évangeline, who studied bacteria found in common areas around the home. She was really enthusiastic!

Proposed By-Law Changes -for Discussion - Possible Adoption in the fall.

Bylaw I: Membership

C. Fees: 2. Add "Membership fee for the first year shall be waived for graduates who apply within two years of graduation. Members who have belonged to the association for forty years shall be considered Life Members and will not be required to pay the membership fee. Life Members will maintain their rights and privileges." [Two years and forty years are just suggestions: two years to allow graduates to decide if they are staying on the Island, and 40 years arbitrarily based on current members. This would be a nice way to recognize our members like Nancy's Mum and Doris who have been there for us for 60 years, or almost as long, like Alta.]

Bylaw VI: Standing Committees

Delete 7. Newsletter Committee, and **8.** Public Relations Committee, renumber remainder, and revise 1. **Add to Bylaw IV: Duties of the Executive Committee Members** "8. The **Communication Coordinator** shall:

- a) be responsible for preparing the Newsletters, using electronic means of distribution as much as possible, with input from the members
- b) maintain the association's web-site, including social networking [not sure of right words, but if we are going to go on Facebook, someone needs to do it]
- c) prepare and distribute press releases about the activities of the Association [or use the wording for Public Relations]
- d) assume other responsibilities at the request of the President.

Add Communication Coordinator to end of *Bylaw III: Executive Committee* 4. Each position...duties may be shared, e.g. Program Coordinator...

Amend Article IV: Governing Body of Constitution to add Communication Coordinator after Program Coordinator.

Other

A couple of tidying-up changes to consider since we are looking at the Bylaws anyway:

- **Delete** Finance Committee from Bylaw IV, add to Bylaw II: Finance "6. The budget shall be prepared by the Treasurer and presented to the Executive for review prior to the Annual Meeting. The budget shall allow for the preparation and distribution of at least two newsletters per year. The budget shall be approved by the members at the Annual Meeting."
- **Change Bylaw II: Finance** "4. ...The auditor shall review and confirm the correctness of [rather than audit] the financial records..." [auditing is a more involved process than what is done now and would require a qualified accountant]
- *Bylaw IV Duties...* 5. The past-President shall:...b) act as liaison to [rather than representative of the association] the UPEI FANS club.
- *Bylaw X: Dissolution* 1....a similar majority at a second meeting within 90 days of the first meeting [rather than 30 days; my experience with the near demise and now resurrection of PEIDA suggests that we would need to take our time if we ever decided to disband...what's the rush?]

PEI Home Economics Association
Program Report, 2008-2009

The 5th annual HO HO HOme Economics Auction was held on Thursday, November 27th, 2008 at Central Queens United Church in Hunter River. Besides being an occasion to get together and have fun, the auction was the major fundraising activity for PEI Home Economics Association this year. Karen Mair, of CBC Radio's Island Morning team, was our lively first-time auctioneer. Through the efforts and generosity of our members who prepared and solicited items to auction, brought lunch, and bid on items, and the participation of family, friends and neighbours who attended the auction, we raised approximately \$1250.

On March 19th, PEIHEA hosted a World Home Economics Day get-together for members, UPEI Family and Nutritional Sciences students with faculty member Dr. Lori Weeks, and graduates of related disciplines. The pot luck supper was followed by a discussion, facilitated by Shari MacDonald, about how we can improve communication and increase collaboration between the Department of Family and Nutritional Sciences and PEIHEA, and finally, a summary of the some of the work that the PEI Food Security Network (of which PEIHEA is a member) has been doing.

At the World Home Ec Day event, we learned that:

- a. Students were unaware of PEIHEA.
- b. The department never refers to itself as FANS; always Family and Nutritional Sciences.
- c. FANS is used to refer to the student club, which includes only an executive of representatives from each year/program.
- d. Facebook is a good way to communicate with students.
- e. Suggestions re: collaborations—turkey drive/turkey time project; PEIHEA could partner with students to fundraise for Christmas family sponsorship; care packages at exam time; volunteer opportunities for students; newsletter articles by students; career presentations for students; presentations re: current university Family & Nutritional Sciences programs for PEIHEA members.
- f. The name “home economics” may be a barrier, as there is little exposure to it, minimal understanding of its meaning, and most students do not identify with it.
- g. There is a shared concern for “family” and “community”.

PEI Food Security Network Report, 2008-2009

The PEI Food Security Network (PEIFSN) is now just over one year old, having been officially formed on March 4, 2008. The community had begun to mobilize around food security issues previous to that, through the work of the Cooper Institute, Dr. Jennifer Taylor, PEI Healthy Eating Alliance, CHANCES Family Resource Centre, and others. PEIFSN brought the partners together for more effective food security work.

The mission of PEIFSN follows: The PEI Food Security Network is an education and action organization committed to achieving food security in Prince Edward Island. It is dedicated to changing community attitudes and public policy to promote: environmentally appropriate practices for the production and distribution of food; the availability of affordable, healthy, culturally appropriate and personally acceptable food; livable income for producers; the right to food; and PEI self-reliance in food.

PEIFSN has been hosted by Women's Network PEI during this first year. The work is done by a Coordinating Committee, chaired by Michelle MacCallum, Executive Director of Women's Network, and three working groups: Working Group 1- access to healthy, culturally appropriate food (including complete labelling); Working Group 2- food costing and development of more advanced food skills; and Working Group 3- guaranteed livable income for producers and ecologically responsible production and distribution.

The work undertaken during this first year includes Advocacy: eg letters to editor such as one about the need for both charity and social justice- "Walking with two feet" that was published in the Guardian; education, both of working group members and the public, through workshops and the Simple Feasts with Island Foods community school pilot, and the exploration of issues.
